Pennsylvania Primary Date: Urgent Ask for Assistance

The Pennsylvania primary election in 2024 is currently scheduled for April 23, the first day of Passover. Not only would tens of thousands of Pennsylvanians be unable to vote in person that day, but hundreds of dedicated poll workers and volunteers would not be able to set up polling places the night before, during the Passover seder. This could lead to even more dire shortages in election workers and volunteers. **Contact your state senator and PA Senate leadership ASAP to ask that they pass the House bill, which moves the primary to April 2**.
